


The Y1 Phonics Screening Check & Supporting Phonics At Home





What is phonics?


Phonics is a way of teaching children to read quickly and skilfully.



We teach the children how to:

- recognise the sounds that each individual letter makes.
- •identify the sounds that **different combinations of letters** make.
- •Two letter sounds like 'sh' and 'oo' are called **digraphs** and 3 letter sounds like 'igh' are called **trigraphs**.
- •blend these sounds together from left to right to make a word.

Children can then use this knowledge to 'de-code' new words that they hear or see. This is the first important step in learning to read.



Why do we have the phonics screening check?

- This is a national standardised check for all Y1 children in the country.
- It is a measure for holding schools to account.
- The check is designed for Y1 children to assess their phonics knowledge and skill in de-coding words.
- Y2 children who did not reach the threshold in Y1 and those new to Y2 will be re-checked.



What will happen?


- The checks will take place in week of Monday 10th June.
- Each child will read 40 words with a familiar adult in a quiet and relaxed setting.
- The checks will take place with the Robin, Jacob, Sophie & the SLT as required.
- There is **no time limit**. The check could take a few minutes or as long as each child needs.
- It will not be a stressful experience! The children see it as a fun quiz.

What sort of words will there be?

 There will be normal words that the children should recognise.

The check will contain non-words as well, such

as:



- We tell the children that these are alien names who wanted to take part!
- Children use their knowledge of sounds to read, or decode and blend these words.

How will I know how my child does in the check?

- We will tell you by the end of the Summer
 Term.
- All Year 1 children who do not reach the standard this year will be re-checked when they are in Y2 (June 2020).

Things to Help

- Home sound cards for the children to use with you at home.
- a list of games and activities you can play at home and on the way to and from school. These activities should be fun and easy for you to carry out – no expensive resources needed!
- Continue to read daily with your child, encouraging them to use their 'reading finger' to sound out (or 'de-code') and blend the words
