### Next Steps

We do not know what the Government will decide about opening schools, but the SLT are starting to think about different scenarios so, like the lockdown, we were prepared and ready for action. We are also thinking about developing opportunity for children to 'hangout' virtually to provide a platform for their to chat to their friends in a screen session with their teachers. This has lots to think about, but after a successful trial with the Grasshoppers last term, we are doing some thinking about this.

### Free School Meals (FSM)

Due to outbreak of the COVID-19, government has decided to issue a voucher of £15 a week to be used on your local supermarket of your choice, for the families who are eligible for FSM.

We have arranged for you to receive them weekly up to this week.

Due to high demand of vouchers being redeemed, Edenred, the company issuing vouchers, has introduced a queuing system, which takes up to an hour to get through.

Having considered this, from next week, 4th May, instead of issuing one voucher of £15 a week, we have arranged to issue one voucher of £30 for two weeks.

Please be aware that the vouchers are live only for a month from the date beginning of the week you receive the voucher. For example, if you receive a voucher next week this means that the voucher's start date is Monday 4th May will expire 4th June. You will not be able to redeem this voucher after 4th June.

## Nursery Admissions

We have completed our Admissions process for the 3-4 year olds Nursery for the upcoming academic year. While this is very exciting news, we seem to be missing some of the crucial part of some applications, which is to do with the funding of your child's place. Families that are eligible for additional free 15 hours funded by HMRC, please make sure to provide us with 11-digit code and your National Insurance Number or forward to us the Entitlement Letter issued by Camden Enhanced Team.
