WHY IS ATTENDANCE IMPORTANT?

At Primrose Hill we acknowledge there are clear links between:

- Attendance and attainment
- Attendance and safeguarding

We are committed to providing a high-quality education for all pupils. By attending school every day and on time children and young people can take full advantage of the educational opportunities available to them.

Research shows a direct link between high attendance and doing well at school.

Good attendance builds confidence, friendship and ambition.

Good attendance is important because pupils:

- get on better with learning and other children.
- cope better with school routines, work and friendships.
- find learning easier because they do not miss out.
- are more successful moving between primary school, secondary school, higher education and employment or training.
- are known to be safe and well by us.

Parents and the school staff should work in partnership in making education a success and in ensuring that all children have full and equal access to all that the school has to offer.

As a school, we will encourage parents and carers to ensure that their child achieves maximum possible attendance and that any problems that prevent this are identified and acted on promptly. It is parents' responsibility to ensure that their children arrive at school on time and return home safely.

Attendance levels



• 97%+, expected attendance. This will help all aspects of a child's achievement and life in school. This will give them a good start in life and supports a positive work ethic.

• 97-91%, below expected attendance. As attendance falls, our concern increases. We follow our stepped approach to take action.

90% or lower, persistent absence. Absence is causing serious concern. It is highly likely to affect attainment and progress and is disruptive to the child's learning.

Not coming to school is a serious concern. However, each case is different and the school knows that there is no standard response. Consideration is given to all factors affecting attendance before deciding what intervention strategies to use. Our Attendance Policy outlines the steps that the school will take to manage and improve attendance.

Dear Ms Harsha Patel,

In response to your email, I was advised to send a letter explaining the risks of double parking and parents dropping off children in the middle of the road. Therefore, this letter provides in-depth information why parents should make every effort to ensure that they park where it is safe for their children and to allow access to other road users.

The Council has a School Crossing Patrols to help reduce the risks of collision and to make the road space safer for pedestrians and other road users outside schools. Hence, double parking and parents dropping off children in the middle of roads is highly concerning.

Risks:

- Stopping in the middle of the road to let off children, leaves young pedestrians at greater risk
 of being hit by a vehicle. It also exposes the lives of other road users to increased danger.
- Stopping in middle of road to let off their children also affects the traffic flow and leads to congestion and possible collisions. This also impacts on local air quality.
- Parents stopping in the middle of the road to let out their children can force them to jaywalk in busy traffic.
- · Double parking is dangerous to pedestrians because their view is restricted.
- Double parking is frustrating because can block another driver from getting into their vehicle to move on because they have been double-parked next to.


It is hope that the information above will encourage parents to rethink and choose kinder road safety actions that show care and consideration for other road users and all members of the school community.

The workshop will explore Emotion Coaching, a parenting approach that supports identifying and validating emotions, while also setting boundaries and limits around behaviour.

How will Emotion Coaching help you and your child?

- To better understand and validate your child's emotions
- To respond more helpfully during moments of heightened emotion
- To implement appropriate boundary setting
- To reduce behaviours that you find challenging
- To further improve the parent/child relationship
- To learn from other parents and carers

This is an interactive workshop, which will involve sharing research, learning about Emotion Coaching and practising strategies. We often find that group workshops are a great space to learn from each other so there will be lots of opportunities to talk about ideas and to think through any challenges that might be around.
